
Two boats set out from Dettah. We passed through Wool Bay and viewed the island where North American General has proposed a drilling program. We landed at the south side of the mouth of Drybones Bay at Dave Smith's old camp, currently owned by New Shoshoni Ventures. Helicopter tours of the Bay area took off from this base. During the helicopter ride, Randy Freeman pointed out areas that had been mapped and studied during this summer's YKDFN field work. This research catalogued traditional use sites such as: graves, old and contemporary camps, spiritual sites, old missions, and other features on the land. This data is currently being inputted into a GIS by the Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre. The concentration and number of sites we observed during our brief trip would likely indicate the importance of the area to the local communities. After a shore lunch of fresh fish we headed back to Dettah, stopping along the way to visit the site of old Fort Providence.

A special thank you is extended to Rachel, James, Morris and Randy for showing us around Drybones and Wool Bays.
