Hello Al,

Please see responses to DKFN final recommendations.

1. If Tamerlane Ventures Inc. can not shut down operations when Caribou get within 500 meters of operations, what mitigation measures can replace this? Is it possible to use fencing?

Tamerlane feels there will be no need for fencing as the monitoring and training program discussed during the Public Hearings will ensure awareness of Tamerlane employees and any contractor/subcontractors to ensure any caribou identified are left alone, not approached or harassed and left to do what they want. Additionally, Caribou encountered will be given the right of way with regard to hauling activities.

2. Traditional Knowledge studies were conducted by TVI and one representative from Deninu Kue First Nation. Deninu Kue First Nation strongly feels that Traditional Knowledge must be incorporated in the design and implementation of the ongoing monitoring that is to be conducted by Tamerlane Venture Inc during the life time, closure and years after for all environmental aspects of the bulk sample project.

Tamerlane appreciated the Deninu Kue First Nation cooperation with the current Traditional Knowledge survey and utilized this survey in its planning initiatives. Tamerlane will employ DKFN personnel and incorporate their TK into design and implementation of monitoring to be undertaken.

3. Archeological studies must be done in the whole vicinity of the Pine Point Pilot Project and remaining mineral claim as well as the old village at Big Buffalo River. These studies should incorporate traditional knowledge of both elders and land users and the physical aspect of the studies should involve youth. Deninu Kue First Nation recommends that Tamerlane Ventures Inc., INAC, and GNWT provide funding for this recommendation.

Tamerlane conducted an archeological study of the R-190 area using local knowledge and assistance from the DKFN and will conduct further archaeological work as appropriate for any of its proposed activities on developing properties.

4. Deninu Kue First Nation membership does a great deal of moose hunting in this area, what studies can be done and will moose be incorporated into the monitoring program?

Tamerlane plans to incorporate moose as part of the wildlife monitoring program and they will be treated in the same way as other wildlife encountered.

5. The proponent must host a terminology workshop to aid interpretation of this new technology and the proposed development of the Pine Point Pilot Project.

Tamerlane is willing to continue working with the Deninu Kue First Nation to increase awareness with regard to the proposed development and future development activities.
