EXISTING PROJECT OVERSIGHT

Independent Peer Review Panel

- ➤ Acts as an independent expert resource on technical issues for the Remediation Project along with the Independent Engineer
- Provides independent advice and oversight on design, technical issues and design changes
- ➤ Reviews and endorses final project proposals prior to submission in order to fulfill regulatory requirements
- Reports to the Management Board



EXISTING COMMITMENTS

- Establish Environmental Management System Working Group
- Establish Aboriginal and Government Body
- Establish Independent Engineer
- Public reporting:
 - Third Party Audit of Environmental Management System
 - Quarterly public reporting
 - Annual Public Reports to summarize and review all operational and environmental data collected in the one-year reporting period
 - ➤ State of the Environment Reports prepared every three years during the initial 15-year remediation period and every five years thereafter, to summarize, review and interpret the data collected and to provide recommendations for modifications to the monitoring program or site operations





OVERSIGHT WORKING GROUP

- Parties have expressed a need for an additional mechanism for community input and oversight to build public confidence
- Based on an Oversight Workshop (March 6-7, 2012), an ad-hoc working group with representation from AADNC, GNWT, the City, YKDFN, AN was struck to explore establishing an arm's-length committee to monitor and to advise on environmental aspects of Project implementation
- Based on this critical discussion and input, AANDC is proposing the following for an Environmental Monitoring Advisory Committee





ENVIRONMENTAL MONITORING ADVISORY COMMITTEE (EMAC)

An Environmental Monitoring Advisory Committee will foster community engagement, input into the remediation process, and maintain public confidence in the Project

The GMRP Team commits to work with <u>all</u> interested and affected governments and organizations with the intent to have the Committee in place prior to starting the full remediation phase



EMAC: MANDATE

- To provide arm's-length advice to the GMRP Team on implementing Project's environmental management system (EMS)
 - Will include advice on adaptive management and best practices
- Will work to increase public confidence through regular engagement with both the proponent and the community
- Provide input to develop and implement EMS and engagement plans
- Advise on long-term operations and maintenance





EMAC: GUIDING PRINCIPLES

- Provide advice to the Giant Mine Remediation Project Team
- Improve environmental management, public confidence, long-term operations and maintenance
- Improve communication with current and future generations
 - Transparent and timely
- Assess recommendations
- Avoid duplication of existing regulatory requirements



EMAC: PROPOSED TERMS

- Composition
 - Independent, qualified members (selection process in discussion)
- Lifespan
 - Exists throughout project implementation and monitoring phases
- Terms Of Reference
 - Reviewed every five years
- Reporting
 - Annually, and as needed
- Dispute Resolution
 - Mechanism in place for disputes related to process

- To ensure we have a remediation plan that is responsive and robust



- Provided:
 - A forum to receive input from public and Aboriginal groups
 - Updates on Care and Maintenance activities
 - Information on plans for site stability
 - Outline of work planned for near future



PUBLIC SESSIONS: MAY 8-10, 2012

- Recurring themes raised:
 - Impacts of mine development on traditional ways
 - Recognition and respect for historical events
 - Ongoing and potential impacts safety of water, tailings dust, ice thinning at diffuser
 - Involvement in future planning and socioeconomic benefits
 - Further discussion of ways to consider Traditional Knowledge
 - Lack of timely information
 - Waste storage plans
 - Remediation of tailings and contaminated soil
 - EA and Regulatory approvals process



ADDRESSING CONCERNS

- Water quality comprehensive study of Back Bay and Yellowknife Bay being conducted
- Ice thinning modeling conducted, indicating no impact on ice thickness; safety monitoring with City Fire Department
- Socio-economic considered in Procurement Strategy; Industry Days held to inform business of opportunities
- Timely information improved communications protocols
- Independent oversight commitment to an Environmental Monitoring Advisory Committee



SESSIONS WITH FIRST NATIONS

- Meetings of Senior Giant Mine Team Held with leadership in
 - N'Dilo (YKDFN) May 9
 - Yellowknife (Tlicho) June 13

Purpose

- To have Project Team describe the plans for remediating the site and potential for socio-economic benefits
- To have the Aboriginal groups describe their capacity and aspirations to participate in remediation

Outcome

- Aboriginal leaders have expressed strong interest in participating
- Aboriginal groups continuing to develop their capacity
- Raised similar issues as those raised during the Public Sessions



GIANT MINE ADVISORY COMMITTEE (YKDFN)

- Membership
 - Eight members
- Purpose
 - To provide a forum for the Giant Mine Project Team to engage with the YKDFN
 - To monitor the Project on behalf of YKDFN
 - To keep YKDFN communities informed
- Interaction between Advisory Committee and Project
 - Project provides funding
 - Project will provide technical support as required
 - GMAC and Project will engage in joint review and planning sessions of the closure plans for each mine component



TYPICAL COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

- Giant Mine team consults extensively with the community on a regular basis. Parties engaged in this process include:
 - Giant Mine Advisory Committee (YKDFN)
 - Giant Mine Community Alliance (City of YK, NWT Mining Heritage Society, Northern Territories of Federation of Labour, Yellowknife Chamber of Commerce, NSMA and YKDFN as observers)
 - City of Yellowknife
 - Universities (e.g., Queen's, University of Alberta)
 - Tours





SUMMARY OF ENGAGEMENT

- GMRP Team is actively and extensively engaged with the public
- Engagement has been particularly productive and increasing this past year
- The engagement process is being established for the long-term (e.g., strong public and Aboriginal advisory bodies)
- Meaningful engagement is fundamental to the success of the Giant Mine Remediation Project
- The goal of this project is protecting the environment and the health and safety of the people of Yellowknife, Dettah and N'Dilo
- We are committed to working with the communities, the public and Aboriginal groups to help achieve these goals



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FUNDING



PROJECT FUNDING MECHANISM

- AANDC is the project sponsor and is responsible for the remediation of the Giant Mine site
- AANDC seeks phased funding for the project through the Government of Canada budgetary process
- Funding for the project is provided by the Federal Contaminated Sites Action Plan (FCSAP)
- Project funding has been earmarked in the government's fiscal framework until 2019-2020




EFFECTIVE PROJECT FUNDING

- Funding for the project has been stable and consistent
- The current funding approach has demonstrated the capacity to effectively manage cost variations and ensure the protection of human health and the environment
- Ministers responsible for funding decisions have been made aware of all of the ongoing costs associated with the project

Since 1999, roughly \$160M has been spent on the Giant Mine project.

OVERSIGHT, ENGAGEMENT AND FUNDING

- The Government of Canada and the GNWT, in selecting the preferred remediation option for the site, have recognized and accepted the GMRP includes long-term care, maintenance and monitoring
- The Government of Canada welcomes the interest and participation of stakeholders and the public in the Giant Mine Remediation Project. We will continue to engage with the public openly, transparently and responsively
- Timely implementation of the remediation plan along with the described environmental management system and oversight mechanisms will ensure that health and safety is protected and that public concerns are addressed and minimized

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
