Community Concerns

- No benefits to North Slave Metis People from the extraction of non-renewable resources on our traditional land
- Discriminatory treatment by the Crown and proponent
- Infringement of the enjoyment of the North Slave Metis People on their traditional lands (ie hunting, trapping, fishing, and gathering, etc.)
- No NSMA representation on the proposed Access Road to NICO mine site
- Wildlife management concerns (especially Bathurst Caribou Herd)

- Francois Beaulieu II, a founding father Territories had a trading post at Lac la Martre in the early 1800s of the Metis of the Northwest
