Wildlife Training

•NWT Mine Health and Safety Regulations

(s. 15.05) require all field personnel involved in mineral exploration undertake bear safety training.

•This requirement provides for both worker safety and reduces conflicts for wildlife.

Archaeological Resources

- •"archaeological artifact" means any tangible evidence of human activity that is more than 50 years old, in respect of which an unbroken chain of possession cannot be demonstrated.
- •"archaeological site" means a site where an archaeological artifact is found.



Recommendations

•The proponent conduct an archaeological impact assessment of the project area before beginning development activities

•The proponent be required to ensure archaeological sites are avoided by a minimum distance of 150 m
