Re: Information Requests for Environmental Assessment of Husky Oil Operations Limited Chedabucto Silica Project

Husky Oil Operations Limited (Husky) has received comments from Mackenzie Valley Environmental Impact Review Board (MVEIRB) dated February 27, 2015 regarding the Environmental Assessment (EA) of Husky's Chedabucto Silica Project. Husky submits the following information in response to the letter. MVEIRB's comments are listed below with their respective responses.

IR#1 - Timing of Activities

The Review Board requests that Husky describe what activities will occur for each year over the life of the project. This will include the bulk sampling and drilling activities. If Husky is not able to give specifics the Review Board requests that Husky provide a likely scenario for the maximum amount, type and timing of activities that may occur for each year over the life of the project.

The Review Board is making this request because the land use permit application does not provide a clear description of the amount and timing of activities that may occur after first phase of the project.

Husky's Response to IR#1

Year 1 Activity (2016):

- March-April: conduct a heliportable drilling program with two drilling rigs. Plan is to drill up to 84 shallow holes to a maximum depth is 250 metres: 70 holes with a reverse circulation rig; and, 10 to 14 holes with a diamond drill rig. A temporary tent camp (2 tents) will be set up as an emergency shelter at the existing DOT quarry in the claims area. Temporary fuel cache and core storage will also be located in the quarry. All equipment will be removed in April at the end of the program.
- August-September: conduct Archaeological Assessment of planned follow-up drilling and mini-bulk sampling locations.

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Year 2 Activity (2017):

- Contingent on the results of the Year 1 drilling program, plan to conduct a follow-up heliportable shallow hole drilling program in March-April. The program will utilize heliportable rig to drill up to 90 shallow holes and a small diamond drill rig to drill up to 20 holes with support logistics similar to the previous year drilling program.
- Contingent on the results of the drilling programs, conduct a follow-up mini-bulk sample program in March-April. Small pits (2 to 3 metres across) will be dug at up to ten (10) locations with approximately 10 tons or 5 ore bags of sand taken from each site. The number of sample sites and their locations will be determined by results of the drilling program. A rubber traced snow cat or equivalent vehicle with a sloop or sled will be used for the sampling program. Access to the project will be from highway #3 along the existing winter access to Great Slave Lake then across the lake to connect with the existing access to the DOT quarry. Pioneering trails will be used to access sample sites. Trail routes will be scouted to avoid trees stands and so that slashing can be kept to a minimum. The winter trails will only be accessibly by snow cat or snow mobile. NO winter roads will be built.
- Contingent on the results of the drilling program(s), conduct possible follow-up geophysical survey in August-September

Year 3 Activity (2018):

- Contingent on positive results from the exploration assessment, conduct an in-depth Traditional Knowledge and Archaeology Study for the area being considered for commercial development
- Contingent a positive result of the exploration assessment, initiate work on a Development Plan for the commercial resource extraction, transportation, processing, export, reclamation and project closure

Year 4 Activity (2019):

- Submit the Development Plan and file LUP/WL application.
- Conduct Environmental Assessment

Consultation with Aboriginal groups and affected parties will be ongoing.

IR#2 - Site Access

With respect to site access the application states that Phase II of the project, the bulk sampling, will require a winter road to access the site. Can Husky please provide additional information including the method of construction, detailed route maps, timing, and any proposed mitigations for any potential impacts resulting from the construction and use of the road.

Husky's Response to IR#2

Husky is not constructing a road but rather utilizing an existing winter access trail. The establishment of a "winter access trail" will not require the withdrawal of water, but will rather utilize a rubber-tracked snow cat or equivalent vehicle to traverse existing snow covered trails



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and the ice crossing. The equipment that Husky is proposing to use is light enough to cross the ice, while following proper ice thickness testing procedures (ice profiling with GPR), without the requirement for flooding the ice. The trail will not be traversable by any wheeled vehicle; common road vehicles will not be able to utilize the winter access trail.

The equipment that Husky will utilize is a Pisten Bully 200 tracked snow cat (or equivalent). The snow cat will be equipped with an attached sled or sloop to transport the mini bulk samples.

Husky revised the regional map and uploaded it to the Wek'èezhìi Land and Water Board registry to show the entire location of the existing winter access trail from Highway 3 across the lake to the existing DOT rock quarry. Please see attached for a copy of this map.

Frozen ground conditions will mitigate potential damage to ground vegetation, surface soils and permafrost. Care will be taken in ensuring that impacts to the ground are minimized. The active program area will be monitored and repairs will be made as required using snow fills. Husky and its contractors will work closely with the GNWT Land Use Inspector particularly at the end of the winter operating season to ensure the ground surface is not disturbed.

Use of the winter access trail will be of short duration (March-April timeframe). This, combined with the fact that common road vehicles will not be able to utilize the winter access trail is expected to be of minimal impact. Husky is committed to limiting the effect of the establishment of the winter access trail associated with this exploration program and will employ the following mitigation measures:

- Frozen ground conditions will mitigate potential damage to ground vegetation, surface soils and permafrost;
- During the site orientation all workers will receive awareness training which will include discussions on: not feeding the wildlife; no hunting; and no harassment of wildlife;
- Restricting vehicular traffic in the area to the defined exploration program area;
- All vehicle operators associated with the exploration program activities will be instructed to adhere to speed restrictions;
- All vehicle operators associated with the exploration program will be instructed, should they encounter wildlife, to stop and allow the wildlife to access and/or cross the vehicle's path without harassment;
- During re-fuelling, drip trays and absorbent pads will be utilized;
- Food and waste management throughout program operations;
- Husky employees and contractors working on the exploration program will be prohibited from utilizing the winter access trail for recreational activities and they will also be prohibited from hunting and fishing in the program area;
- Unnecessary over-flights of fixed-wing aircraft and helicopters will be avoided;
- Wildlife sightings on the winter access trail will be communicated to program personnel and will be reported to the wildlife monitor;
- Wildlife/environmental monitor will be used throughout the exploration program operations; and,



 The wildlife/environmental monitor will be expected to observe and document wildlife and impacts thereon and to ensure implementation of environmental protection measures. The monitor will be expected keep a wildlife log and will be instructed to collect data on observations such as: species type, date, time, location, and animal activity.

Program activities associated with the establishment of the winter access trail are not believed to have deleterious effects on air, climate, or atmosphere apart from the use of gasoline or diesel vehicles and equipment which will emit greenhouse gases but are necessary to conduct the exploration program activities.

IR#3 - Cumulative Effects

Pursuant to ss. 117(2)(a) of the *Mackenzie Valley Resource Management Act*, the Review Board considers cumulative effects in its determinations. Cumulative effects are the combined effects of the development in combination with other past, present or reasonably foreseeable future developments and human activities. In addressing cumulative effects, Husky is encouraged to refer to Appendix H of the *Review Board's Environmental Impact Assessment Guidelines*.

Husky will:

- Describe and provide rationale for which past, present or reasonably foreseeable future developments and human activities are being considered in the cumulative effects assessment.
- Identify which of the valued components may be affected by other past, present or reasonably foreseeable future developments and human activities.
- Assess the likelihood, duration and magnitude of the combined effect of these human activities on the identified valued components.
- Describe any mitigation measures proposed to reduce or avoid the predicted effects, specifying if and how adaptive management will be used, and provide an assessment of any residual cumulative impacts.

The level of effort to complete this cumulative effects assessment is related to the magnitude and duration of the Chedabucto project effects.

Examples of past, present or reasonable foreseeable developments include the abandoned commercial fishing camp at Wrigley Point, the old DoT quarry, past exploration activity in the area, or other winter roads in the area including ice roads across the north arm.

Husky's Response to IR#3

The proposed exploration activities are short duration programs, conducted for the most part during frozen ground conditions to minimize impact on the people, land, vegetation and wildlife. Traditional Knowledge and Archeological studies have been conducted to identify heritage sites;



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as a result of these studies, nine proposed Year 1 drill locations were cancelled. Any subsequent follow-up drilling and mini-bulk sampling sites will be similarly assessed.

Valued Components (VC) Affected by the Program:

Wildlife Habitat Connectivity VC

- The heliportable drill rigs that will be used for the exploration program have a small footprint and reducing the amount of slashing required thereby minimizing impact
- Over land access to the program area will be along the existing winter access to the DOT quarry. Rubber tracked snow cat or equivalent vehicle will be used on pioneering trails to conduct the program. No winter roads or ice bridges will be built.
- The temporary tent camp, fuel cache and core storage are located within the existing DOT quarry so no new land disturbance is required. Husky has received a letter from DOT confirming their use of the quarry for this program.
- The only summer scope program would be acquisition of geophysical data which would be conducted on foot without line cutting, resulting in little or no impact on the environment. Timing of the geophysics acquisition program would likely be in August-September to minimize impact on wildlife.
- The residual cumulative impact of the exploration program on this VC is minimal

Wildlife Mortality Risk VC

- The proposed drilling and bulk sampling programs will be conducted in March-April winter conditions which should be low risk for wildlife mortality
- No winter roads will be constructed so there is a low risk of vehicular collisions with wildlife
- The program will be completed before migratory water fowl arrive and bird nesting initiates
- Field operations personnel interaction with wildlife will be kept to a minimum;
 feeding wildlife, hunting and fishing are not permitted by anyone
- The residual cumulative impact of the exploration program on this VC is minimal

Traditional Land Use and Harvesting VC

- We are not aware of any active trapping activity within the program area
- Harvesting of moose is the primary activity
- The Old Fort Rae heritage site is 35 kilometres to the northwest of Husky's mineral claims
- Old Fort Island was identified as an area with significant heritage, so there is no drilling planned for the CHE-4 and CHE-5 mineral claim blocks in Year 1
- First Nations environmental/wildlife monitors will be employed as part of the field operations personnel
- The short duration of the exploration programs will minimize impact on this VC

Public Infrastructure VC



- There are no permanent residents within the program area. The closest population centre is the city of Yellowknife 50 kilometres to the east.
- Field operations personnel will be housed in Yellowknife and transported daily to the program area by rotary or fixed wing aircraft
- There will be no winter roads built, so there will be no over land public access to the program area
- The short duration of the winter exploration programs should result in minimal impact to this VC
- Community Health and Wellness VC
 - Husky and Aurora have strict alcohol and drug policies that will be enforced
 - Safety is the number one priority and a Safety plan is included with the LUP application
 - Emergency equipment and shelter will be provided as per the emergency response plan.
 - The proposed field operations are located at least 50 kilometres from the nearest communities and should have minimal impact on this VC

Past, present or reasonable foreseeable developments:

- On the CHE-6 mineral claim, the federal government's CARD remediation of an abandoned commercial fishing camp at Wrigley Point, will not be impacted by the proposed short duration winter exploration programs.
- Existing core storage areas from previous mineral exploration programs will not be disturbed by the proposed exploration program.
- Other than the old DOT quarry which has not been used for some time, there is no industrial activity on or near to the program area. Permission to use the quarry for the proposed exploration program was obtained from the DOT.
- All equipment and supplies will be removed from the program area in April at the end of the field season minimizing the residual cumulative impact.

IR#4 - Alternative Means

Pursuant to ss. 117(2)(e) of the *Mackenzie Valley Resource Management Act*, the Review Board considers alternatives means for carrying out project activities in its determinations. Husky will provide a description of alternative means for carrying out project activities that in its opinion are technically and economically feasible. This may include consideration of such things as the timing or location of activities or site access.

Husky's Response to IR#4

Conducting the proposed shallow drilling activity as short duration heliportable programs during frozen ground conditions in March-April minimizes the impact on the vegetation and wildlife. No winter roads are required to access the drill sites. Drill crews are housed in Yellowknife and transported daily by helicopter to the program area, so no field camp is required. A temporary tent camp will be set up in the quarry for use in the event of an emergency and to log any potential core. This site will also have a first aid station. All equipment will be removed from the program area in April.



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- Drill site locations for the Year 1 program are defined in the LUP application. The number of and location of follow-up drill sites will not be known until results of the previous year have been analyzed. Maximum number of holes drilled will not exceed 200.
- A larger sample will need to be collected from promising areas before commercial potential can be assessed. The number and location of sites to be sampled is contingent on the drilling results. Conducting the mini-bulk sampling program during frozen ground conditions in March-April minimizes the impact on the vegetation and wildlife. The material removed from each site will consist of approximately 10 tons or five ore bags of unconsolidated sand. Prior to sampling, any surface cover will be removed and set aside, and a small pit will be dug to remove the sand, then surface material will be replaced. A rubber-tracked snow cat or equivalent vehicle with a sled or sloop will be used to conduct the sampling program. As a result only pioneered trails will we required to access the sample sites and transport the samples to highway #3. No winter roads will be required.
- The only summer scope program would be acquisition of geophysical data which would be conducted on foot without line cutting, resulting in little or no impact on the environment. Timing of the geophysics acquisition program would likely be in August-September to minimize impact on wildlife.

IR#5 - Public Engagement

The Review Board requests that Husky provide an updated Engagement Plan and Record. This should include any additional engagement that has occurred since the land use permit application was submitted and any plans for future engagement.

The Review Board encourages Husky to meet with interested groups outside the environmental assessment process, and to place any information from those discussions they consider may be relevant to the Review Board's decision on the public record. The following items are required for consideration of public engagement:

- An engagement log, describing dates, individuals and organizations engaged with, the mode of communication, discussion topics and positions taken by participants, including:
 - All commitments and agreements made in response to issues raised by the public during these discussions, and how these commitments altered the planning of the proposed Chedabucto Project;
 - All issues that remain unresolved, documenting any further efforts envisioned by the parties to resolve them;
- Description of all methods used to identify, inform and solicit input from potentially interested parties, and any plans Husky has to keep engagement moving forward;
- How Husky has engaged, or intends to engage, traditional knowledge holders in order to collect relevant information for establishing baseline conditions and the effects assessment of potential impacts, as well as a summary table indicating where and how

traditional knowledge was incorporated (see Review Board's Guidelines for Incorporating Traditional Knowledge in Environmental Impact Assessment).

The Review Board considers both traditional knowledge and scientific knowledge in its deliberations. In addition, ss. 115(c) of the MVRMA states, as a guiding principle for the Review Board, the importance of conservation to the well-being and way of life of the Aboriginal peoples of Canada to whom s. 35 of the *Constitution Act 1982* applies and who use an area of the Mackenzie Valley. The developer will make all reasonable efforts to assist in the collection and consideration of traditional knowledge relevant to the project for the Review Board's consideration. Where it is applicable, the developer will make all reasonable efforts to incorporate traditional knowledge from Aboriginal culture holders in its assessment of specific impacts. The developer should refer to the Review Board's *Guidelines for Incorporating Traditional Knowledge* into the Environmental Impact Assessment Process.

Husky's Response to IR#5

- Husky has attached an updated Engagement Plan and Engagement Log. The Engagement Plan was updated at the request of the Tłicho Government, Department of Culture and Lands Protection who submitted comments during the preliminary screening review of Husky's Land Use Permit (LUP) application. The only new engagement that has occurred since the LUP application was submitted was email correspondence with the Kwe Beh Working Group regarding attendance at their next regularly scheduled board meeting.
- Husky met face to face with the Kwe Beh Working Group (KBWG), the North Slave Métis Alliance (NSMA), and the Yellowknives Dene First Nation (YKDFN) on three separate occasions. The first was an introductory meeting to introduce the Husky team, the mineral claim and project area. The second round of meetings went into more detail about the project area with a preliminary project description and scope of work. In addition, we had in-depth discussions about the next steps to initiate a Traditional Knowledge (TK) study and finalize the Engagement Plan with each organization. In the third meeting, Husky shared the finalized project description and detailed scope of work of the field program, the preliminary findings of the archaeological field study, and further discussion on the Engagement Plan.
- At each meeting, Husky shared program area maps and delivered a PowerPoint presentation and encouraged questions and open dialogue about the proposed program. At the last face to face meeting with each organization, Husky did not get the impression that there were any "unresolved" issues.
- Had the LUP been approved, Husky intended to notify the three Aboriginal organizations, in writing, of the proposed start date in advance of commencing of the field program. Given that the application was referred to an EA, Husky now intends to submit letters to each of the three Aboriginal organizations to confirm that no field activity will take place until further notice, along with an offer to meet face to face should they have any questions.
- As stated in Husky's Engagement Plan and Engagement Summary submitted with the LUP application, Husky has utilized several methods of communication with affected parties throughout the past year including phone calls, email, and face to face meetings.



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To date we have scheduled specific trips for pre-arranged face to face meetings with affected parties and have also made ourselves available for unscheduled meetings when we visit the NWT on other business. Husky plans to continue dialogue with affected parties particularly once we know more about the EA Terms of Reference and timeline.

- Meaningful discussion and engagement will be a critical part of the planning for any field operations. Husky will consult on subsequent proposed programs during the planning stage, well in advance of conducting field operations and well before submitting proposed programs to the Land Use Inspector. The same rigor will be applied to subsequent/follow up activity as was applied to the proposed 2015 program.
- During the planning process, Husky initiated an archaeological study of the proposed drill locations and sent out a request for proposals in June 2014 to the KBWG, NSMA, and YKDFN to conduct preliminary Traditional Knowledge (TK) studies of the project area, relevant to the small scale of the initial exploration phase of the project. During the first meeting that Husky had with the Wek'èezhìi Land and Water Board (WLWB), we expressed our intent to work with the designated Aboriginal organizations to initiate TK studies. Although the WLWB confirmed that it was not a required component of the LUP application process, they were encouraged by Husky's initiative.
- At the time of submittal of the LUP application, only the YKDFN had completed their preliminary TK study and submitted a summary to Husky (Appendix VII of the original application). The Tłįchǫ Government, Department of Culture and Lands Protection submitted a proposal to Husky for their preliminary TK study and work commenced in early December, 2014 with a report expected at the beginning of March, 2015. Husky has not yet received the report from the Tłįchǫ Government but will review the report and incorporate the traditional knowledge into our assessment of future work on the property.
- Despite multiple attempts to commission a preliminary TK study with the NSMA, no proposal has been submitted to date due to limited available resources. It is Husky's intent to continue to work with the NSMA as their internal resources become available to capture TK as we progress through future programs. In order to compliment the preliminary TK studies, Husky offered to bring a few Elders from each organization out to the proposed program area during the archaeological field study. The visit provided the Elders with an intimate view of the mineral claim area and the proposed exploration project and an opportunity to visit individual sites where the archaeological field team had discovered artifacts. Tłįchǫ Elders joined the site visit on August 18, 2014, Elders from the YKDFN participated on August 19, 2014 and the NSMA Elders visited on September 17, 2014.
- Husky has made all reasonable efforts to assist in the collection and consideration of traditional knowledge relevant to the project, especially considering that TK was not a required component of the LUP application process.



- Certainly, results of the archaeological study were incorporated into the final design of the field program. Husky retained Golder assisted by locally appointed Aboriginal support staff to complete an Archaeological Impact Assessment (AIA) within the project area. Golder completed the archaeological field study during the summer of 2014 to ensure the project area was visually inspected prior to the initial exploration program planned for late winter/early spring of 2015. The intent of the archaeological program was to compile information about the recorded and potential heritage resources within the project area and provide specific direction for the protection, management and/or recovery of these resources, if required. Based on the outcome of the AIA, nine proposed drill hole locations were omitted from the 2015 program.
- Husky has previously stated to the Aboriginal groups that these initial archaeological and TK studies are preliminary based on the small scale of the of the initial exploration phase of the project. Husky has every intent to conduct an in-depth Traditional Knowledge and Archaeology Study in the future, for the area being considered for commercial development and will continue to work with the Aboriginal groups to incorporate this knowledge into our assessment of future proposed work on the property.

Husky Oil Operations Limited Chedabucto 2015 Drilling Program Great Slave Lake - North Arm Engagement Plan

Background

In 2011 Husky Oil Operations Limited ("Husky") identified a high quality silica mineral deposit on the west side of the North Arm of Great Slave Lake; at a site we are calling Chedabucto. Preliminary assessment of the deposit included field mapping, geophysical surveys and reconnaissance sampling. Laboratory analysis of samples showed that the silica sand is highly suitable for use as proppant in hydraulic fracture stimulation treatments of unconventional oil and gas resource plays. Husky has staked claim through a third party, Aurora Geosciences Ltd. ("Aurora"), to ~40,000 acres of crown land. Subsequent geophysical and samples from a hand auguring work program, determined that there is the potential for a sizable resource in place. The mineral claim has been expanded to 74,000 acres (300 square kilometres).

On January 21, 2014, the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency ("CanNor") hosted a Resource Development Advisory Group ("RDAG") meeting at which Husky was introduced as the owner of the Chedabucto mineral claims and the silica deposit was described to representatives from the Government of Northwest Territories, Government of Canada, Land and Water Boards and the Regulator. Husky utilized the advice provided in this meeting to kickoff engagement with land holders and potentially affected persons.

Husky reached out to potentially affected Aboriginal groups in an introductory letter on February 18, 2014. The letter contained background information on the Chedabucto silica deposit and a request to meet face-to-face. Meetings were subsequently arranged between the Tłįchǫ Government – Kwe Beh Working Group, the Yellowknives Dene First Nation ("YKDFN") and the North Slave Métis Alliance ("NSMA"); the Akaitcho Interim Measures Agreement Implementation Office and NWT Métis Nation asked to be kept informed of our activity, but did not feel face-to-face meetings were required at this time. Being new to operating in the region, the intent of the introductory meetings was to provide information on who Husky is, to describe the claim area and to seek guidance on how best to proceed with engagement. Tables 1a, 1b and 1c provide a chronology of engagement with these groups. Key messages were received at the introductory and subsequent meetings including:

- There is a long history of use of this area by each the of groups;
- Each of the groups want to conduct preliminary Traditional Knowledge studies for the Chedabucto claim area:
- Appreciation that exploration of the claims is required to assess the potential for commercial development;
- Concerns over what the impact of commercial development will be and how the resource extraction will conducted;
- Concerns were expressed about the risks involved with hydraulic fracture stimulation treatments being employed by the oil and gas industry;

- Would silica sand from this project be used for and improve the economics of the Sahtu oil shale resource development; and
- Given the early stage of exploration, it would be premature for Husky to conduct community visits for the 2015 drilling program.

In response, Husky initiated Archaeology and Traditional Knowledge studies. Elders from the Thcho region, YKDFN and NSMA participated in site visits. Verbal responses were provided for the hydraulic fracture treatment risk concerns; Husky is working with the Government of the Northwest Territories and the Canadian Association of Petroleum Producers ("CAPP") to have an information workshop on the oil and gas industry made available to the groups in 2015. Regarding plans for development; it is early days in the exploration of the Chedabucto silica deposit and it is premature to speculate on what commercial development will entail. Husky is committed to transparency and has assured the groups that should the exploration program determine that there is a potentially commercial project, extensive engagement will be essential part of formulating a Development Plan. The Chedabucto silica deposit is not being evaluated solely for the Sahtu oil shale play, but could a source of proppant for resource play operations south of the 60th parallel as well.

At face-to-face meetings in September, Husky presented and discussed draft Engagement Plans (Tables 1a, 1b and 1c) with representatives from each of the respective Aboriginal groups. The representatives were asked share the draft Plans with their leadership and forward any comments, suggestions or changes to Cheryl McLean at Husky. Follow up emails were sent to each of the groups December 2nd, but, to date no comments or suggested changes have been received from any of the groups. The enclosed Engagement Plans (Tables 1a, 1b and 1c) are living documents and we expect that they will be updated from time to time.

Husky also had information sessions regarding the Chedabucto silica deposit with the NWT & Nunavut Chamber of Mines, NWT Chamber of Commerce and the Dinàgà Wek'ehodi Candidate Protected Area Working Group. In September, the NSMA hosted Husky representatives on a cultural retreat at their established camp at Old Fort Rae. Also in September, Husky sponsored, and personnel participated in, Įłàà Katì - a Traditional Knowledge Symposium hosted by the Tłycho Government in Yellowknife.

Prior to submission of the Land Use Permit application, Husky met with representatives of the Thcho Government – Kwe Beh Working Group, the YKDFN and NSMA. A copy of the presentation that was used to provide details the 2015 drilling program is enclosed along with the Record of Engagement.


