Giant Mine Remediation Plan Environmental Assessment

Dear Ms. Testart,

The Northwest Territories was built on mineral exploration and development. These activities opened up the North, and brought jobs, people, services and investment. The NWT Mining Heritage Society is committed to preserve mining heritage in the Northwest Territories and to promote the development of facilities, sites, and exhibits that will further the understanding and appreciation of mining, mineral exploration, and geology in the N.W.T., while contributing to the tourism and economic potential of the North.

For the past eight years the NWT Mining Heritage Society has been an active member of the Giant Mine Community Alliance. The group has an important interest in property on the Giant Mine site. The Society is in the process of constructing a mining heritage centre located at Giant Mine's former townsite and A-shaft area. The townsite is now part of a City of Yellowknife lease (17889T) and the Society has been negotiating a small sub-lease to occupy a former Giant Mine building ("rec hall"), which will become the primary exhibit hall of the mining heritage centre. The Society has also been occupying city leased-land adjacent to the Boat Launch parking lot for outdoor display exhibits. A third parcel of land that the Society occupies is the A-shaft area along the highway. This area is Commissioner's Land however the Society owns the buildings and will eventually seek to have title to this area as part of our future mining museum. The society is also interested in former houses located at the Giant Mine townsite and is working with the City of Yellowknife on a workplan for this area.

A summary and map of our physical interests at Giant Mine is listed in Appendix A.

The Society has worked closely with the DIAND Cleanup Team over the past eight years to safeguard and promote its interests. Bill Mitchell, former project superintendent with Giant, has been one of the Society's principal contacts and supporters. The museum project has been delayed because of fund raising difficulties and now, it is feared, because of the Environmental

Assessment process. However, the Society is still active and has vested interests in the future of the Giant Mine, specifically is it relates to its buildings at A-shaft and the Giant Mine townsite.

The A-shaft buildings were acquired in 2000-2001 under an agreement with Miramar Mining Corporation and its manager John Stard. Occupation of the building known as the "commissary" began immediately as a place to store a collection of mining artifacts. Maintenance of these buildings has been ongoing to keep them structurally safe and secure. The A-shaft powerhouse and hoist room received small roof patches in 2004, and the A-shaft headframe was inspected by a structural engineer in 2005 and repaired. The roof of the rec hall building was replaced in 2007 and other repairs are being made. The Society hopes to enter into an official lease for this parcel of land with the City soon. The Society, in agreement with the Giant Mine crews, has complete access to these buildings and provides security and maintenance.

Until a formal agreement is made for the transfer of land around A-shaft, the Society wishes to make its interests known to MVEIRB as the Environmental Assessment planning moves forth. The Society has invested eight years worth of volunteer hours and over \$200,000 to build a mining museum in this area and they want to make sure this investment is noted and respected by all parties.

The Society also notes that they have identified several items of mining machinery and nostalgia at Giant Mine that has yet to be officially transferred. A list of these items is attached as **Appendix B**.

The Society and its members look forward to working with MVEIRB and the DIAND Cleanup Team to ensure that their interests are preserved.





Since 2002, the Society has been collecting mining-related photographs, equipment, memorabilia and geological samples from sites throughout the NWT. It plans to preserve, display, share and promote these items in the NWT Mining & Geological Interpretive Centre.

The Society and its members are working towards the development of this Centre which will be located in Yellowknife, NWT. It will serve as the focal point for interior and exterior displays and will house the extensive collection of historical artifacts. It is anticipated that the Centre will open in the summer of 2009.

The NWT Mining & Geological Interpretive Centre will offer a museum, tea room, gift shop and geological walking tours. It will also include the original Giant Mine 'A' Shaft headframe built in the 1940s, power house and some of the original houses from the Giant Mine town site.



The site is a few minutes drive from Yellowknife on the shore of Great Slave Lake. Currently, there is an outdoor display of past and present underground and surface mining equipment. It is a lovely spot to stop and have a look around, take photos and enjoy a picnic.




