Mandate

- The Department of the Environment Act provides
 Environment Canada with general responsibility for environmental management and protection
- The Departments obligations extend to and include matters related to:
 - Preservation and enhancement of the quality of the natural environment including water, air, and soil
 - Renewable resources including migratory birds and other wild flora and fauna
 - Meteorology



 Environment Canada views the environmental assessment process as a critical component of sustainable development because it provides a defined opportunity for the consideration of environmental impacts for any proposed development.



Legislation Administered by Environment Canada

- Canadian Environmental Protection Act (CEPA 1999)
- Fisheries Act Pollution Prevention Provisions Section 36(3)
- Canada Water Act
- Migratory Birds Convention Act (MBCA)
- Migratory Birds Regulations (MBR's)
- Species at Risk Act (SARA)
- Canada Wildlife Act
- Wild Animal and Plant Protection and Regulation of International and Inter-provincial Trade Act



Legislation - CEPA

- CEPA 1999 includes provisions for:
 - establishing national environmental quality objectives, guidelines and codes of practice
 - toxic substances management
 - environmental quality monitoring
 - ocean disposal
- Authority to require emergency plans for toxic or other hazardous substances is provided in Part 8 of CEPA 1999. Environmental emergency plans for such substances must cover prevention, preparedness, response and recovery



Legislation – Fisheries Act

- Section 36(3) of the *Fisheries Act* prohibits the deposit, into fish-bearing waters, of substances that are deleterious to fish
- The legal definition of "deleterious substance" provided in subsection 34(1) of the Act, in conjunction with court rulings, provides a very broad interpretation of deleterious and includes any substance with a potentially harmful chemical, physical or biological effect on fish or fish habitat
- Pertinent regulations under the Fisheries Act include the Metal Mine Effluent Regulations



Legislation – MBCA & MBR

- Migratory Birds Convention Act and Migratory Birds Regulations administered by the Canadian Wildlife Service (CWS) of Environment Canada
- EC provides expert advice in environmental assessment review processes focusing primarily on identifying potential adverse effects to migratory bird populations and habitats, and appropriate measures to mitigate those effects
- Paragraph 6(a) of the Migratory Birds Regulations states that no one shall destroy or disturb the nests or eggs of migratory birds
- Paragraph 35(1) of the Migratory Birds Regulations states that no person shall deposit or permit to be deposited oil, oil wastes or any other substance harmful to migratory birds in any waters or any area frequented by migratory birds

Legislation - SARA

- EC administers and enforces the Species at Risk Act (SARA)
- With the implementation of SARA, any projects requiring an environmental assessment under federal law that are likely to affect a listed species or its critical habitat need to identify the adverse effects, and, if the project proceeds, steps must be taken to avoid or lessen those effects and monitor them
- The project plan must respect recovery strategies and action/management plans for listed species

- Issues identified by EC
 - Safe transport, storage, disposal of fuel and/or hazardous material
 - Appropriate sump siting
 - Disposal of drill waste
 - o On-ice storage

- Issues identified by EC
 - Non-winter activities coinciding with migratory birds
 - Winter ice road decommissioning if over land
 - Demobilization of on-site camp
 - Species at risk
