Re: Community Hearings and Formal Public Hearings

This note to file describes the differences between community hearings and public hearings and assists parties in determining which hearing to attend. A community hearing provides an opportunity for people who live in that community to present their views on a project. Formal public hearings allow for all interested parties to outline their position on a project and present final submissions.

Features common to both types of hearings

- Review Board members are present at hearings and the Chairperson of the Review Board presides
- The developer attends hearings, presents the project and is available for questions from parties, the public and the Review Board
- Hearings are transcribed and form part of the public record

Community hearing (informal)

- The purpose of an informal community hearing is for the Review Board to hear the views of a community that may be affected by a development
- Members of the public or organizations from the community are encouraged to present their views at a community hearing
- Parties from outside the community may attend a community hearing in order to observe and answer questions but do not generally make presentations of final submissions

Public hearing (formal)

- The purpose of a formal public hearing is for the Review Board to hear the views of all parties that that may be affected by or have an interest in a development
- All parties are invited to attend a public hearing to present their final submissions and answer questions from the Review Board and other parties
