- What are the most important issues you would focus on if you were on the Review Board?
- Can you tell us about areas of special concern along the proposed route?
- What do you think about the impacts the Developer (GNWT) has identified?
- What impacts do you currently experience each year when the winter road opens? How might cultural and social impacts from the highway be different or build upon the impacts during the winter road season?
- What do you think about identified impacts to rivers, creeks, harvesting and other areas of possible concern?
- How have your concerns raised previously been addressed?
- Can you share your insights into further traditional knowledge or land use (other than through your independent TK studies) that may need to be brought forward?
- What kinds of recommendations would like to make to reduce impacts?
- What are your solutions to any of the issues shared today or otherwise identified?
